Dear Colleagues,

We are conscious that our first Call for Paper Abstracts may not have reached all the parts that it should have reached so we are circulating a second call for paper abstracts, with a deadline of the 17th February 2006. The Conference represents an exciting opportunity to present your work to an international audience (we already have nearly 50 abstracts submitted) and also to combine your attendance with a second Conference, the European Population Conference 2006 which follows on directly (21-24 June 2006) at the same venue. We look forward to hearing from you.

Event

The 1st and 2nd International Conferences on Population Geographies were held in St Andrews in 2002 and 2004. These were successful meetings each attracting over 100 participants from more than 20 countries. The range of papers on various issues relating to migration, fertility and mortality were impressive and we hope that the participants enjoyed the occasion as much as the organisers. It was agreed that the conference should become a biennial event, and we are therefore hosting the third meeting in **Liverpool** in the summer of 2006. The fourth meeting will be held in the summer of 2007 in Hong Kong, so as not to clash with the 31st Congress of the International Geographical Union (IGU).

Participants

Although the conference is designed for geographers, contributions are welcome from those who would not regard themselves as population geographers, but are working in pertinent research areas. For example, we would welcome speakers from other disciplines including Demography, Sociology, Economics, Social Anthropology, who are interested in broadly geographical aspects of population. Postgraduates are also encouraged to attend and offer papers and there will be a Postgraduate prize for the best one. Attendance does not require the presentation of a paper, but we would strongly encourage people to submit papers.

The plenary address to the Conference will be given by Professor Martin Bell of the University of Queensland. Martin Bell founded the Queensland Centre for Population Research in 2001, which has already established a position as a leading centre for innovation in population and migration research.

Papers

The remit for papers is intentionally broad and papers should be submitted on any topic relevant to population geography. Please ensure that you send abstracts of papers to Darren Smith (see below) before **17th February 2006**. Those who wish to organise themed sessions are encouraged to contact Darren Smith or Phil Rees (see below). The organising committee will decide the strands of the conference once they have received the abstracts. Papers will be 20-25 minutes long, allowing for 5-10 minutes discussion in ½ hour slots.

The Population Geography Research Group with support from the Royal Geographical Society is pleased to offer <u>eight bursaries</u> for students and the unwaged, which will consist of the registration fee and a contribution towards travel and accommodation.
